From the Sports Desk with John Loven Lady Lions Victorious on Senior Night


district contest on Friday, March 7.

The Lady Lions (3-8-3/2-4-3 in district) were facing a second round match against the Lady Knights from Eagle Mountain. The two teams had tied 0-0 in their first meeting on Feb. 17. The Lady Knights were sitting in fourth place in district (the last playoff position) just ahead of the Lady Lions who were in fifth place.

For two teams who did not score a single goal in their first meeting, they put on an offensive display in the first half of their second meeting, scoring four4 goals between them!

Fortunately the Lady Lions accounted for three of those goals. They road that first half lead all the way to the end and left W.O. Barnes Stadium with a 3-1 victory.

As the game began, the Lady Lions quickly and constantly kept the Lady Knights on defense. CHS completely dominated the first 20 minutes of the game. Junior Alexa Rivera got the first CHS

> A few minutes later senior Joselyn Salazar's free kick just barely sailed over the net (32:30).

> Four more CHS kicks on goal followed (31:46, 28:48, 26:42 and 23:42) but all just missed the mark.

> Finally at the 22:41 mark the Lady Lions hit paydirt. Salazar executed a perfect header which got past the Lady Knights goalie and gave CHS a 1-0 lead.

> Up to this point in the game, Eagle Mountain had not even managed a single shot on goal, against a tough CHS defense. However, in less than 30 seconds they got two. The first came on a free kick at the 19:34 mark which was wide left. But the second one at 19:08 scored and tied the score 1-1.

> After this moment, it was all CHS. Seven more shots on goal by the Lady Lions took place over the next 15 minutes but none scored. Then, at the 4:13 mark, an assist by Salazar led to a score by senior Alyssa Rosales and gave CHS a 2-1 lead.

> As time was winding down in the first half, Rivera was fouled. Her free kick (from well over 30 yards) sailed just over the leaping Lady Knight goalie into the back of the net. With 1:44 left until halftime, the Lady Lions led 3-1.

> The second half began with CHS defending the last shot on goal the Lady Knights would get this evening. It occurred at the 31:38 mark but CHS sophomore goalie Danna Chavez made a great play to keep the ball from scoring.

> The Lady Lions would go on to get seven more shots on goal but none were able find the back of the net. The game ended in a 3-1 victory for the Lady Lions.

> The victory pushed CHS into third place in the district standings. This means they will advance to the playoffs.

Discarded tires laying around in the yard are a source of mosquito breeding. The City of River Oaks has initiated an event to collect old, discarded tires out at the street curb.

On the Wednesday Bulk Collection Day for residents, the city will pick them up and get rid of them at no charge. This offer is good through April 30, 2025.

Residents are requested to limit the number of tires to be discarded at any one time to no more than four used, discarded tires.

Where there are more than four tires, please contact the Public Works Department to schedule a special pickup at 817-626-5421, extension 332. Otherwise, residents can call for pickup, or else public works will pick up tires when placed on curb.

This free service is for residential customers only. The City will not collect tires disposed of from businesses since commercial collection is under contract with a commercial waste hauler.

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From StatePoint Take These Six Steps to Manage Your Blood Pressure

High blood pressure, also known as hypertension, affects nearly half of adults in the United States, and only about 1 in 4 with this condition have it under control, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Unmanaged hypertension can be dangerous and in many cases, fatal. Medical experts say that controlling your blood pressure is possible and it starts with having the right information.

"Nearly half of all American adults have high blood pressure, and many don't even know it. High blood pressure is a 'silent killer,' often having no overt symptoms, but increases the likelihood of heart attack, stroke and other serious health risks. I urge you to know your numbers and make the simple lifestyle changes that can help you control your blood pressure and live a long and healthy life," says Jack Resneck Jr., M.D., president of the American Medical Association (AMA).

To get on the right track, consider these tips and insights from the AMA:

1. Know your numbers. Hypertension is diagnosed when your systolic blood pressure is greater than 130 mmHg or your average diastolic blood pressure is greater than 80 mmHg. Visit Manage-YourBP.org to better understand your numbers.

2. Monitor blood pressure. Once you learn your blood pressure numbers, take and keep regular records using an at-home blood pressure monitor. For an accurate reading, the CDC says to sit with your back supported for five minutes before starting and wait at least 30 minutes after drinking or eating a meal. You should also avoid stimulants for at least 30 minutes beforehand, as the CDC says that smoking and drinking alcohol or caffeine can elevate your blood pressure. If you take medication for hypertension, measure your blood pressure before your dose. Share your numbers with your health care provider.

3. Eat right. Reduce your intake of processed foods, especially those with added sodium and sugar. Eat less red meat and processed meats, and add more plant-based foods, such as vegetables, fruits, nuts, seeds and olive oil to your diet. Also, reduce your consumption of sugar-sweetened beverages and drink more water instead. Drinking sugary beverages, even 100 percent fruit juices, is associated with a higher all-cause mortality risk.

4. Drink alcohol only in moderation. If consuming alcohol, do so in moderation -- up to one drink per day for women and two drinks per day for men, and only by adults of legal drinking age.

5. Be more physically active. Do at least 150 minutes a week of moderate-intensity activity, or 75 minutes a week of vigorous-intensity activity. Be sure to include a mix of cardiovascular exercise, strength training and flexibility. Obtain guidance from your doctor if you aren't sure if it is safe for you to exercise.

6. Maintain a healthy weight. If you are overweight, losing as little as 5 to 10 pounds may help lower your blood pressure. Consult your doctor about safe ways to maintain a healthy weight.

Suburban Newspapers, Inc. Texas History Minute by Dr. Ken Bridges Texas Metal: Lithium Discovery Sparks New Era of Innovation and Investment



The soil has long provided much for Texas, from farming to oil. As technology advances, Texas turns to the soil again. Many investors and business owners are excited about the possibilities of lithium. A large amount of the light metal promises deep in the Earth to start an important new era for many areas of East Texas.

Lithium was discovered by Swedish chemist J.A. Arfwedson in 1817. With only three protons in its atomic nucleus, it is one of the lightest elements in existence. Its unusual configuration of its three electrons allows it to bind to other elements easily, making it highly flammable. In fact, dropping pure lithium in a bucket of water would cause an explosion, but pure lithium is rarely found in nature. These same properties make lithium a good conductor for electricity and heat. Lithium is also used in nuclear research and as a component in some types of nuclear weapons.

It can also be used as an additive for certain types of fuel for rockets and missiles. The largest known sources of lithium are in Chile, Australia, Bolivia, Argentina, and China. It is sometimes found in ocean water and some plants and sea plankton. In recent years, an increasingly reliable source of lithium has been isolating it from within brines.

During World War II, lithium grease was used as a lubricant for some aircraft engines because of its ability to work at high temperatures. Lithium is also used to produce certain types of ceramics and glass, particularly some types of ovenwares.

Lithium is also the primary ingredient in a common antidepressant. Because of this, lithium was an ingredient in 7-Up until the 1940s. Several cities had natural sources in lithium in their water or had lithium added, a process called lithiation. Cities with lithiated water often reported lower rates of crime and suicide. However, cities reconsidered these policies and stopped the practice in the 1940s. Since the 1950s, mental health professionals have commonly prescribed it to treat depression, bipolar disorder, and other conditions.

Today, lithium hydroxide and lithium peroxide are used in air purification systems in outer space and in submarines. Lithium peroxide is also used for emergency oxygen candles for these as well. Because lithium burns with a red color, it is sometimes used to make red fireworks.

Its use in batteries has made lithium the subject of renewed focus. As the electric car grows in popularity, lithium demand grows with it. Its unique electron configuration makes it ideal for use in electricity and led to the creation of the lithium-ion battery. These batteries can produce more power than the traditional lead or zinc batteries and had a longer lifespan. And it makes far easier to recharge, something that was difficult for other kinds of batteries.

NASA developed the first lithium battery in 1965, but the forerunner of the modern lithium-ion battery emerged in 1974. By the 1990s, it had been perfected. It began to be used in products as simple as children's toys to cell phones and then electric cars. One Texas scientist, Dr. John B. Goodenough of the University of Texas, helped make the new battery come to life. The discovery and many uses of the lithium-ion battery led the 2019 Nobel Prize in Chemistry to be awarded to Goodenough, French scientist Rachad Yazami, and Japanese chemist Akira Yoshino.

Geologists discovered a major lithium vein curving from western Mississippi into Arkansas and across East Texas. These finds combined could yield untold riches and important business investments for the region over time. While deposits in North Carolina, Nevada, and Wyoming have gained attention, the fields across East Texas could be a billion-dollar find by itself, with the lithium available potentially as valuable as the oil fields of the region of a century before.

The soft metal had been laying quietly under the Earth for millions of years, part of the geologic landscape of the region. For its many uses, it could potentially power the future.
