Castleberry Volleyball Falls to Eagle Mountain

The CHS volleyball team has played much better overall this year. After going winless in the 2023 season, the team has already won double digit games this year. The new head coach Jaylen Gonzalez has helped turn the program around. The team entered their contest with Eagle Mountain with an overall record of 10-11 on Tuesday, Sept. 24 at home. The Lady Lions had a tough time hanging with the very tall, athletic Lady Knights from Eagle Mountain and fell in straight sets 3-0.

The first game quickly put on display the Lady Knights talent and size. Eagle Mountain jumped out to a 5-1 lead following two kill shots and a block of a CHS spike. After the Lady Knight lead stretched to 9-2 Coach Gonzalez called time out. However, the Lady Lions did not help their cause much due to committing numerous unforced errors. The Lady Knights lead grew to 18-7 and Coach Gonzalez called another time out. Eagle Mountain ended the set emphatically with another kill shot to win the first set 25-11.

The Lady Lions played their best of the night in game two. With the help of serves by senior Lucero Saenz (#3), CHS took a 6-2 lead. The Lady Lions lead grew to 8-2 before the Lady Knights began to storm back. Eagle Mountain outscored CHS 9-4 to take the lead 11-10. The Lady Lions did tie it back up 11-11 before the game got out of hand. From this point, EMHS took total control of the game. They outscored CHS 7-1 to take an 18-12 lead. The Lady Lions called timeout to try and stop the Lady Knights momentum. Unfortunately, it did not work as Eagle Mountain finished on another 7-1 run to win the second set 25-13.

Castleberry was never really in the game during the third set. The Lady Knights again took advantage of their taller front line (and more unforced errors by the Lady Lions). EMHS jumped out to an 11-1 lead, with 7 of these points being produced by their front line (three kills, two dinks, one spike and one block). The lead grew to 17-3 and CHS called timeout. The Lady Lions had a short burst of life and outscored the Lady Knights 5-4, highlighted by an ace by junior Xiomara Garcia (#1). CHS got another service ace by freshman Camila Resendez (#15) but eventually fell 25-12. Eagle Mountain took the match 3-0.

2025 Texas Fish Art Contest Opens for Entries

(TFFC) has opened the Texas division of restore this Texas icon to its native range. Wildlife Forever's 2025 Fish Art Contest for entries.

The Fish Art Contest, accepting entries until Feb. 28, is part of an international conservation education program designed to foster youth interest in fish, fisheries and fishing.

"The Fish Art Contest does a tremendous job of exposing students across Texas to the wonders of fish and fisheries resources through the nexus of art," said Tom Lang, TFFC director. "We always look forward to this time of year when we are once again amazed by the outstanding work and artistic interpretations of these young Texans."

Participants must submit a completed entry form and an original illustration of a wild fish found in Texas. Applicants in fourth through 12th are also required to submit a one-page creative writing piece. Once the entrance form is submitted, applicants must mail their artwork to TFFC, 5550 FM 2495, Athens, TX, 75752. The physical artwork must have a landscape orientation between 8x10 inches and 9x12 inches and be postmarked no later than Feb. 28.

The Texas Fish Art Contest's new category this year is the Special Species Award, which will showcase a focused species or set of species each year. One winner will be chosen from all entries and spotlighted at sheets. the TFFC. Students must correctly label their artwork and be identifiable as the coradditional paperwork for consideration.

For the 2024-2025 contest year, the focus species is the Guadalupe Bass, the state fish of Texas.

This year's award honors Shirley Watson and her third-grade class at Decatur Elementary School, which, in 1989, realized Texas had no official state fish. They traveled to Austin and testified in front of lawmakers about why a fish found "only in Texas" was the right fish for the job and their efforts paid off. Additionally, winners will earn automatic entry to Wildlife Forever's national contest. Texas students may choose to enter national specialty awards with fish not found in Texas, however, they will not be eligible for Texas state awards due to the one entry per student limit.

"We have a unique opportunity to celebrate the talents of our Texas students, and the beauty of our diverse fish found in Texas," said Kate Barkalow, Education and Interpretation Coordinator at TFFC. "In doing so, we also recognize the amazing efforts of our teachers and biologists who support them. To complete their piece of art, students research their fish, its habitat and conservation efforts being made to protect the species, forging a connection between the student and fish."

Educators who wish to have their students enter the 2025 contest can find entry forms, rules, guidelines and more online. A lesson plan offers interdisciplinary curriculum including lessons and activities, a species identification section profiling each state fish, a glossary and student work-

Fort Worth Legend, Amon G. Carter



Amon G. Carter was another of the larger-than-life figures that dominated Texas business in the early 20th century. His efforts cemented Fort Worth's attempts to become a major industrial and cultural center for the Southwest.

Carter was born in 1879 near the small town of Crafton in Wise County. He quit school at the age of 11 to help support the ternational Airport while Dallas continued family.

In 1905, he settled in Fort Worth where he soon found work as the advertising manager of the new Fort Worth Star newspaper. However, the newspaper quickly faltered. To save the paper, Carter in 1908 led an effort to raise money to buy the competing Fort Worth Telegram. On New Years Day 1909, he combined the two papers into the Fort Worth Star-Telegram that became one media holdings into television. In 1948, of the dominant papers of West Texas.
