## Free Fishing Day in Texas is Set for June 6

The annual Texas tradition of Free Fishing Day arrives at public waterways throughout the state on Saturday, June 6. Texans and out-of-state visitors can cast their lines without a fishing license on a public waterway each year on the first Saturday in June.

Anglers help sustain sport fishing opportunities through their purchase of a fishing license, which is one of the primary sources of funding available to TPWD for fisheries resource conservation. Management efforts such as fisheries monitoring, fish stockings, fish habitat improvements and angler access improvements are driven by the purchase of fishing licenses, and these efforts help keep Texas one of the best places in the country to go fishing. For anglers to make the most of Free Fishing Day, TPWD offers multiple resources to provide fun, high-quality fishing opportunities to folks of all skill levels and ages.

- Fishing 101 - Learn the basics of fishing with tips and a variety of videos. Find resources for how to get started, safety, supplies and gear, casting and baiting, cleaning and storing fish on the TPWD Learn to Fish webpage.

- Visit the Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center (TFFC) - Grab your family for a day of free fishing from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center is offering free admission for everyone, and visitors will have a chance to catch a tagged catfish

and win a prize of their choice during “Fish Tag Friendly”. The event will also feature hourly drawings for summer pass packages and visitors can watch the dive show at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m., followed by hatchery tram tours immediately after each show. Visitors may bring their own fishing tackle or borrow gear from the TFFC.

## *Decades of History Now Available Online Through Digital Archive*

More than four decades of local history are now just a click away. The White Settlement Library, in partnership with the University of North Texas Libraries and the *White Settlement Bomber News*, has completed the digitization of Bomber News editions published between 1957 and 1997, [making them available online to the public for the first time](#).

The collection is accessible free of charge through the Portal to Texas History, providing a valuable resource for genealogists, researchers, educators, students, families and community members interested in exploring White Settlement’s past.

The digital archive preserves thousands of pages documenting local government, schools, businesses, community events and the everyday stories that have shaped White Settlement over the decades.

The project was made possible through a grant from the U.S. Institute of Museum and Library Services, administered by the Texas State Library and Archives Commission (Grant No. LS-259205-OLS-25). Additional editions of the Bomber News, covering years through 2020, are expected to be added to the online archive in the coming months.

The digitization effort helps ensure that White Settlement’s history remains accessible to future generations while providing a searchable record of the people, places and events that have defined the community.

throughout the state. The Lake Finder page on the TPWD website can help anglers find lakes by region or alphabetically. Information and fishing tips on more than 150 lakes are available. Check out the River Fishing page to find out where to get access to Texas' flowing waters.

- Saltwater Fishing from a Pier – There are numerous wheelchair-accessible fishing piers available for public use up and down the coast. Piers are a great place for the entire family to try saltwater fishing without the need for a boat. Public access sites can be found in every bay system.

- Go Fishing in the City – TPWD's Neighborhood Fishin' lakes provide urban angling access for the entire family across the state. All 18 Neighborhood Fishin' lakes provide a great opportunity to catch channel catfish, including five lakes in Dallas-Fort Worth, four in the Houston area, two each in the Austin and San Antonio areas, and one each in Amarillo, College Station, San Angelo, Waco and Wichita Falls. Information on lake locations and how-to fishing videos can be found on the Neighborhood Fishin' website.

- Community Fishing Lakes – Check out all the community fishing lakes in Texas which can be great options for Free Fishing Day and year-round.

- Go Kayak Fishing on a Texas Paddling Trail- With more than 3,700 named streams, 15 major rivers and some 3,300 miles of tidal shoreline along the Gulf Coast, Texas offers unlimited possi-

bilities for paddling adventures and angling opportunities of all types. Enjoy improved and maintained fishing and paddling access to rivers, creeks, lakes, ponds, bayous and bays on any of the 83 official Texas Paddling Trails available throughout the state. Kayak fishing opportunities also abound through TPWD's River Access and Conservation Areas (RACA) program.

- Fish in a State Park- Guadalupe River State Park, Lake Arrowhead, and Lyndon B. Johnson State Park and Historic Site are offering a variety of Free Fishing Day events. Check out the state parks event calendar for more information. Although June 6 is designated as Free Fishing Day in Texas, fishing is complementary year-round at every Texas State Park.

- Fishing's Future National Take a Friend Fishing Month – Fishing's Future is conducting a National Take a Friend Fishing Month event throughout June. For more information visit the official event website.

Buy a License - If you enjoy the benefits of fishing, please consider purchasing a fishing license to support natural resource conservation. The Year-from-Purchase All-Water Fishing Package for Texas residents is a great value, allowing anglers to fish in fresh and salt water. It's valid from the date of purchase through the end of the purchase month of the next license year. (Example: License purchased on March 13, 2025, expires March 31, 2026.)

## ***NCTCOG Invites Input on Transportation & Safety Initiatives***

The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) invites the public to provide input on Transportation Conformity, heavy-duty diesel emissions tampering and a draft of the Regional Bicycle Safety Action Plan, during a hybrid public meeting at noon on Monday, June 8.

The meeting will be held in the Transportation Council Room at the NCTCOG offices, located at 616 Six Flags Drive in Arlington. Those unable to attend in person can view the meeting online at [PublicInput.com/nctcogJune26](http://PublicInput.com/nctcogJune26). Residents can also participate by calling 855-925-2801 and entering code 2070. Public comments will be accepted until Tuesday, July 7.

The U.S. Department of Transportation has granted a successful transportation conformity determination for Mobility 2050, the long-range transportation plan for North Central Texas. Federal law requires Metropolitan Planning Organizations with a non-attainment designation to perform air quality analyses when a new metropolitan transportation plan is developed.

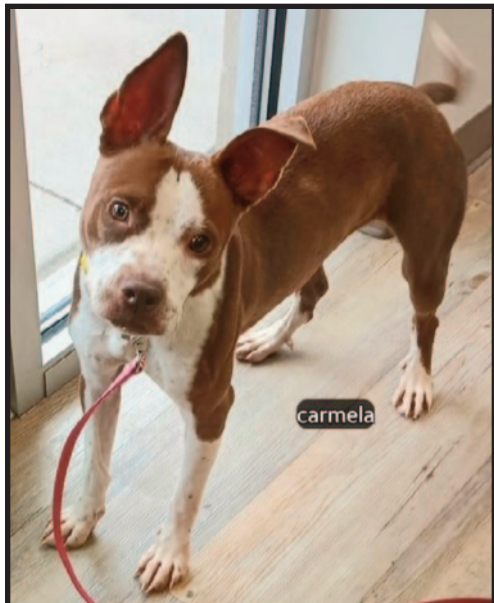
Additionally, staff will provide background on the Heavy-Duty Diesel Emissions Tampering Detection Program. NCTCOG recently acquired devices as part of a Truck Assessment and Goods Movement Demonstration Project that can detect if an emissions system has been tampered with. Several tests will be executed throughout the region on fleets and local commercial vehicles for further analysis.

Staff will also provide an update on the North Texas Parking Requirements Evaluation, which reviews 126 sites to see how often developers exceed zoning minimums. Findings suggest that, along with improving data, cities and developers should expand their use of parking management tools and strategies.

Finally, NCTCOG is requesting public input on a draft version of the Regional Bicycle Safety Action Plan. This document details bicyclist crash patterns and fatalities, as well as reduction strategies and recommendations. The draft plan is available at [PublicInput.com/BikeSafetyActionPlan](http://PublicInput.com/BikeSafetyActionPlan) for public review.

## Tarrant County Sheriff's Office Seeks Owners of Unclaimed Property

The Tarrant County Sheriff's Office is asking residents to review a list of unclaimed property currently held by its Property and Evidence Division and claim any belongings that may belong to them before the items are disposed of under state law.

The notice was issued in accordance with Texas Code of Criminal Procedure Article 18.17, which governs the disposition of abandoned or unclaimed property.

According to the sheriff's office, owners have 90 days from the date of notice on each listed item to claim their property. Items not claimed within that timeframe may be sold, transferred or otherwise disposed of as permitted by law.

Residents can view the list of available property and instructions for filing a claim through the [Tarrant County Sheriff's Office Property and Evidence Division webpage](#).

To claim property, individuals must provide proof of ownership. Acceptable forms of verification may include a serial number, a dated purchase receipt, a previously filed stolen or lost property report, photographs showing the claimant with the item, descriptions of unique identifying characteristics, access codes or combinations, court orders, written releases from investigators, or legal

documents such as a death certificate and will.

For property associated with a known owner, including evidence from a case or court-ordered return items, the owner's name will be listed with the property.

All claimants must present a valid driver's license or state-issued photo identification card when retrieving property.

The sheriff's office requires appointments for all property pickups. Walk-in visits are not permitted. Appointments can be scheduled by calling 817-884-2000 during regular business hours.

If property remains unclaimed after the 90-day period, the county may dispose of the items and deposit any proceeds from a sale into the Tarrant County treasury after deducting storage and disposition costs. Items sold after the claim period may be offered through Rene Bates Auctioneers Inc.

The Tarrant County Sheriff's Office Property and Evidence Division is located at 300 W. Belknap St. in Fort Worth. Office hours are 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday, excluding county holidays.

## Tarrant County Residents Invited to Explore Criminal Justice System Through Citizen Prosecutor Academy

Residents interested in learning how criminal cases move through the justice system will have an opportunity this fall through the Tarrant County District Attorney's Office Citizen Prosecutor Academy.

The free educational program is designed to give participants an inside look at the criminal prosecution process, from the initial investigation of a case through trial proceedings.

Throughout the academy, Assistant District Attorneys and investigators will lead classes explaining the various stages of the criminal justice system and the role prosecutors play in seeking justice on behalf of the community.

Participants will also have the opportunity to tour the Tarrant County Corrections Center and gain firsthand insight into the county's criminal justice operations.

The Fall 2026 Citizen Prosecutor Academy begins Sept. 3 and continues through Nov. 12. Classes will be held on Thursdays from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m.

The program is open to Tarrant County residents and is offered at no cost.

Organizers say the academy is ideal for residents who want a better understanding of how criminal cases are investigated, pros-

ecuted and resolved, as well as those interested in civic engagement and public service.

Applications are currently being accepted, with a deadline of Aug. 7.

# Roger Sherman: The Founding Father Who Signed America's Three Defining Documents

History is sometimes made in dramatic moments in public but is often made behind the scenes. There were many important figures involved in the different stages of the American Revolution and the establishment of the nation's system of free government. One of the most important was Roger Sherman of Connecticut. The soft-spoken, pious man was the only man to sign all three of the nation's most important founding documents: the Declaration of Independence, the Articles of Confederation, and the Constitution.

Roger Sherman was born in Massachusetts in April 1721. His father was a farmer. His education was limited as there were few opportunities for education in early colonial America. His father, however, owned an extensive library, which the younger Sherman studied extensively.

With only a grammar school education, Sherman learned to be a shoemaker. When his father died in 1743, he decided to move his family to nearby Connecticut. After settling in New Milford, he quickly set up a shoemaking shop and quickly became involved in the young, growing community. He studied as much as he could to provide for his family and to better serve the community. Within two years, he became the town clerk and then the county surveyor.

He was raised as a Puritan and stayed faithful to those ideas his whole life, often writing on religious questions. Sherman regularly spoke out against slavery, believing it was sinful. Though a Puritan, he believed in freedom of religion and believed that all Christians should have the same equal rights instead of restricting rights only to those who belonged to the state church. Sherman was eventually appointed to the board of directors for Yale College, which had been founded as a seminary. Eventually, Sherman became treasurer for the college and worked to build a new chapel on the campus. For his service, he was awarded an honorary degree.

Sherman's success grew. He taught himself the law and was admitted to the Connecticut bar in 1754. In 1755, he was elected to the Connecticut legislature, where he served intermittently until 1784. In 1765, he was appointed as judge of the court of common pleas. Though he assumed multiple roles in government, which was accepted at the time, he played an important role in shaping not only the laws of Connecticut but of the emerging United States.

As the American Revolution approached, he joined those colonists protesting the actions of Great Britain. In 1774, he was selected to represent Connecticut at the First Continental Congress in Philadelphia. Protesting British acts against Boston, he supported a continent-wide boycott of all British goods.

In 1775, he was again selected to the Second Continental Congress. As fighting broke out between the colonists and the British across New England, he believed that independence was the only option the colonies had left. In June 1776, Richard Henry Lee

made a motion for the colonies to declare independence. Sherman was appointed to a committee of five to draft a statement to Great Britain, the colonists, and the world why the colonies were seeking independence. The committee included Ben Franklin, John Adams, and Robert R. Livingston, but was led by Thomas Jefferson, who did most of the writing. As a result, he played a key role in developing one of the founding documents of the new nation and signed the Declaration of Independence.

Continuing to serve in the Continental Congress during the American Revolution, he also helped craft the nation's first national constitution, the Articles of Confederation. Sherman signed and Congress approved the Articles of Confederation in 1777, but they were not approved until 1781. This new government would only have a one-house national congress and would not have an executive or a federal judiciary and soon proved unworkable.

In 1781, he stepped down from Congress and resumed his work as a judge in Connecticut. At the end of the war, his expertise was needed again. He assisted Ben Franklin in negotiating the final peace between the U. S. and Britain, which would become the Treaty of Paris. When the treaty was signed in 1783, with Britain recognizing American independence, Sherman, too, was one of the signers.

When the Constitutional Convention convened in Philadelphia in 1787, Sherman was again called to serve. At 66, he was one of the older delegates and worked with James Madison, who led most of the debates and established most of the ideas of what became the modern federal government, including the three branches of government, the separation of powers between the branches, and a system of accountability.

The issue of how the states would be represented threatened to derail the proceedings. Larger states wanted representation based on population while smaller states wanted equal representation in the new Congress. Sherman devised a compromise that saved the proceedings and became one of the defining features of the federal governments. The Great Compromise, or the Connecticut Compromise, allowed both sides to have what they wanted: a two-house Congress with the House of Representatives determined by population and the Senate represented with two Senators from each state. Sherman would also sign the Constitution, which is now the oldest national constitution still in use in the world.

After ratification of the Constitution in 1788, the first elections under the new document were held. Sherman won election to the House of Representatives, where he served for one term. In 1791, Connecticut legislators appointed him to the U. S. Senate. He served in the Senate for just over two years before he was struck with typhoid fever. At the time, there were no treatments for the condition, leading to his death in July 1793 at age 72.
